Introduction

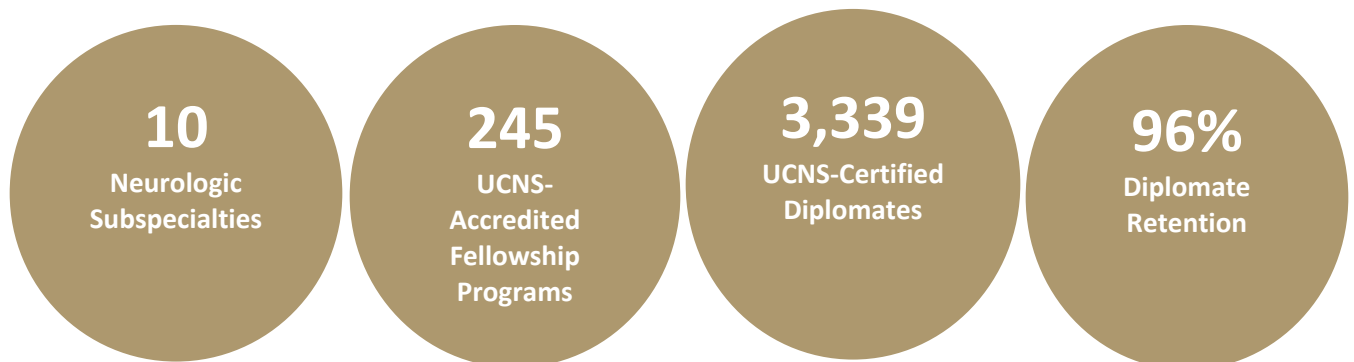

Established as an independent 501(c)(6) nonprofit organization, the UCNS is recognized in the neurology community as the certifying and accrediting body for emerging neurologic subspecialties.

UCNS Welcomed New Leadership

New officers and members of the Board of Directors were welcomed and began their terms in May 2024. Salvador Cruz-Flores, MD, MPH, was elected to serve a two-year term as Chair of the Board of Directors. Dr. Cruz-Flores has served on the Board since 2021 as a representative of the ANA and served as Vice Chair from 2022 - 2024. He is currently a Professor and Founding Chair of the Department of Neurology at Texas Tech University at El Paso and is UCNS-certified in both Neurocritical Care and Neuroimaging.

Promoting UCNS Accreditation and Certification at Industry Meetings

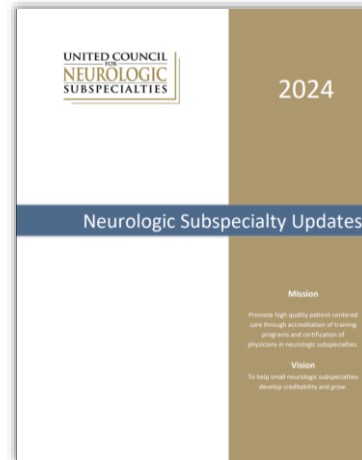

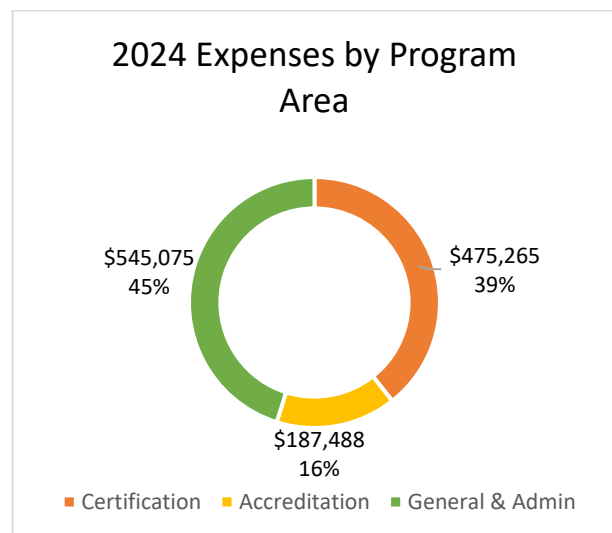
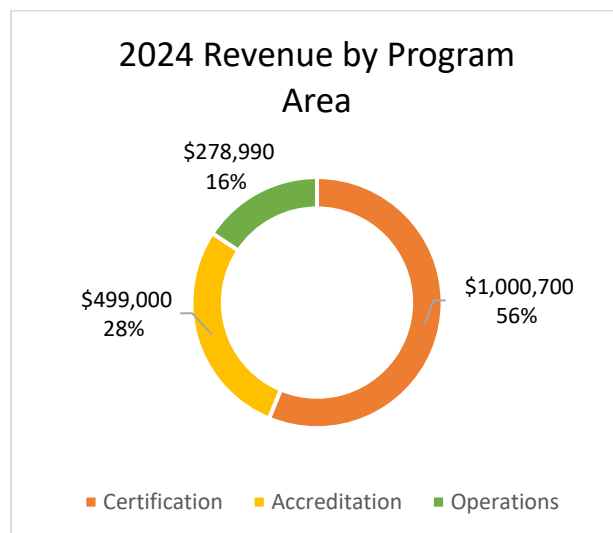

Financial Update

The UCNS had a strong financial year due to the number of 2024 certification and accreditation applications exceeding budget expectations, and C-cert annual fees payments coming in ahead of the projected revenue. Surplus funds ensure the future stability of the organization when the organization encounters financial fluctuation and provides the ability to implement new initiatives. The year ended with an increase in net assets of \$566,657 and total net assets of \$3,833,943. The **2024 Audited Financial Statements and Form 990 reports** are available on the UCNS website.



Accreditation

UCNS Common Program Requirements Undergo Review

UCNS fellowship program requirements define the minimum standards with which programs must demonstrate substantial compliance to achieve and maintain UCNS accreditation. The **UCNS Common Program Requirements** recently underwent the five-year review process, which included program directors from all 10 UCNS-recognized subspecialties. The public was **invited to comment** on the proposed revisions before they are considered and approved by the Accreditation Council and Board of Directors.

Neonatal Neurocritical Care Develops Training Milestones

A task force of subject matter experts representing the subspecialty of Neonatal Neurocritical Care (NNCC), underwent the task of developing the milestones used to evaluate a NNCC trainee's progression through a fellowship training program. The task force members were appointed by the Newborn Brain Society, the sponsoring organization for the subspecialty. The milestones were presented for **public comment** prior to final review and approval by the Accreditation Council and UCNS Board of Directors. The finalized **NNCC Milestones** are now available for implementation by the subspecialty's training programs.

Subspecialty Fellowship Programs Attain Accreditation Status

In 2024, UCNS added 15 new accredited training programs and experienced a loss of 12 programs for a net gain of three programs, bringing the total number of **UCNS-accredited training programs** to 245.

Accreditation is a voluntary process of evaluation and peer review based on UCNS and subspecialty-defined standards. Fellows who complete a UCNS-accredited program meet the training eligibility requirements to apply for certification in the subspecialty.

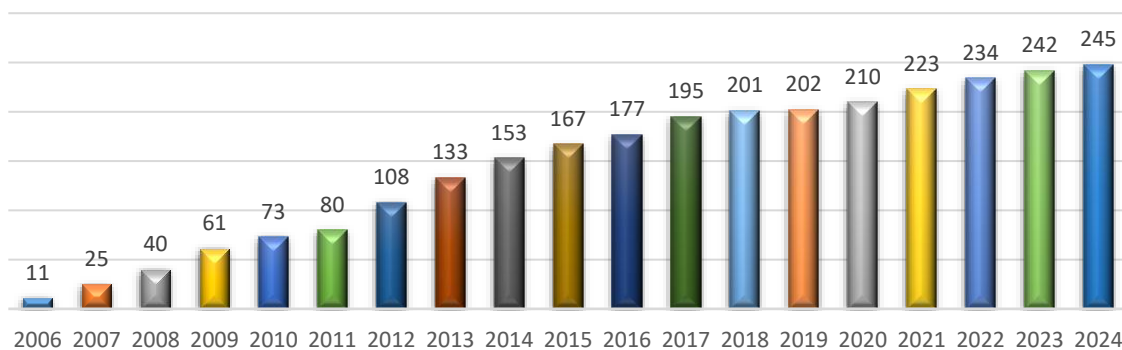

Status of Training Programs Revealed in Annual Reports

Annually, UCNS-accredited training programs submit reports that provide valuable insight into the status of all programs relating to the number of fellowship program spots available and the percentage of fellowship openings filled within each subspecialty. The annual reports provide an in-depth view of overall program growth trends for each subspecialty. Certification

Certification Application Discount Implemented for Fellows of UCNS-Accredited Programs

On November 7, 2024, the UCNS Board approved a \$250 discount on certification examination application fees for fellow graduates of UCNS-accredited training programs. The discount is automatically applied during the online application process for fellow applicants who are eligible to apply for a UCNS subspecialty certification examination under the UCNS-Accredited Fellowship Training application pathway. By offering a discount on the certification application fee, there is an added incentive for fellows of UCNS-accredited programs to pursue certification following completion of their fellowship. The reduced cost to apply for UCNS certification examinations under this application pathway went into effective January 1, 2025, and provides a benefit for graduating fellows of UCNS-accredited programs and an added value for the programs in their fellow recruitment efforts.

First Neonatal Neurocritical Care Certification Examination Administered

The inaugural **NNCC certification examination** was administered during the week of November 4-8, 2024. Demonstrating their expert knowledge in NNCC, **44 physicians passed** the subspecialty's inaugural UCNS certification examination and now hold the distinction of being UCNS Diplomates. The next **UCNS NNCC Certification Examination** will take place in November 2026.

Certification Examination Applications Exceed Projections

The UCNS administered certification examinations in 2024 for the subspecialties of Interventional Neurology, Headache Medicine, Neonatal Neurocritical Care, Behavioral Neurology & Neuropsychiatry, and Autonomic Disorders. All five subspecialties exceeded their application projections with 299 total applications received and a total of 267 physicians earning certification in their subspecialty.

Retention of Diplomates Remains Strong Under C-cert Program

Retention of diplomates with the transition to C-cert exceeded expectations with a total of 96% of all UCNS diplomates maintaining their certification. For comparison, only 61% of diplomates maintained their certification under the previous recertification model. There were 2,681 diplomates who ended the year with a “Certified – Meeting Requirements” status and 391 diplomates who remain certified but have outstanding requirements at year-end with a status of “Certified – Not Meeting Requirements.” With the addition of 267 new diplomates who passed a 2024 certification examination, the year ended with a total of 3,339 certified diplomates.

Earning CME and Self-Assessment Credits are Added Benefits of C-cert

UCNS diplomates are eligible to earn up to 15 *AMA PRA Category 1 Continuing Medical Education (CME) credits™* in addition to *American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology (ABPN) Self-Assessment (SA) credits*. The UCNS applies annually to the American Academy of Neurology Institute and ABPN for their review and consideration of the annual C-cert activities for *AMA PRA Category 1 CME credits™* and ABPN SA credits that can be utilized by diplomates in meeting their primary certification requirements. Diplomates spent an average of 12.72 total hours completing their annual C-cert requirements throughout the year and claimed their CME credit hours upon passing their C-cert self-assessment quiz, the final step in the annual C-cert requirements.
